Ghost Birds of Montana and Incredible Crossbills

Though Halloween has passed, ghosts will be the topic of this month's Bitterroot Audubon Society meeting - ghost birds, that is. Judy Hoy, a wildlife rehabilitator for more than 45 years, will give a fascinating program about "ghost" birds whose feathers developed with abnormal coloration. She will discuss and show photos of a variety of birds which grew white feathers where colored feathers usually occur.

As a special treat, a live Red-tailed Hawk which featured an abnormal molt pattern as a juvenile will be at the meeting. The photos of this hawk that you will see at the presentation are possibly the first ever photographic documentation of a Red-tailed Hawk that grew adult feathers as a pre-fledgling rather than normal colored juvenile feathers. There will also be photos of other amazing birds featuring abnormal feather patterns from photographers around Montana.

Judy will present a short program entitled "Incredible Crossbills," highlighting how Crossbills get their bills to cross, what happens when they are unable to do so, and other interesting facts about this species.

She has made numerous presentations at schools, libraries, etc. where she often has brought some of her rehabilitated birds. As a scientific researcher, Hoy has co-authored several published papers on subjects including Flammulated Owls, white-tailed deer, Montana's dryland mosses and one published in October on *Brachygnathia superior* in ruminant species.

He read books on geology, got equipment for cutting and polishing rocks, and eventually began doing lapidary work. He made all kinds of jewelry and display items.

My Dad was always fixing and building things around the house. He also loved reading Westerns, playing cards, fishing, and hunting. When he retired he read all of James Michener's books, moved with my Mom to Utah and started gardening (too cold in Wyoming). He eventually learned how to propagate roses and developed a rose garden with 70 bushes. That was in addition to growing fruit trees and all kinds of vegetables. Now at age 101, he lives with me and continues to be active: he plays bridge and pinochle weekly, listens daily to books on tape from the Montana Library for the Blind (he is legally blind), makes Christmas and birthday cards for family and friends, and follows sports - especially the Denver Broncos and the New York Giants. Above all, he has maintained a great sense of humor. His famous secret to a long and healthy life, in addition to keeping the mind and body active is, "Prunes in the morning and cheese at night, makes everything come out all right." -Kay

October Field Trips

Members of Bitterroot Audubon participated in two field trips in the month of October. Steve Hoffman of Montana Audubon and Kate Davis of Raptors of the Rockies organized a trip on October 1. Steve and Kate led a group of 19 people to the Sula Peak Lookout in the southern Bitterroot to observe migrating raptors. Despite vigilant scanning of the skies, very few raptors were observed. The group saw four Turkey Vultures, two Sharp-shinned Hawks, two Red-tailed Hawks, two Bald Eagles, a Cooper's Hawk, an American Kestrel, a Peregrine Falcon, and five unidentified raptors. An ominous weather system, complete with lightening, rain, and gusty winds, may have limited the raptor flight. A few Yellow-rumped Warblers entertained the group in between raptor sightings.

The Bitterroot River Important Bird Area committee organized a second field trip on October 8. Twelve participants visited the MPG Ranch near Florence, MT to view four quarter-acre exclosures built through a partnership between Bitterroot Audubon and the MPG Ranch. The exclosures were constructed to prevent ungulates like deer, elk, and moose from browsing the riparian vegetation that provides essential bird habitat. Heavy browsing in the past has limited the establishment and regeneration of important floodplain species such as cottonwood, aspen, and willow trees.

Participants on this field trip were able to view the exclosures and the habitat they protect, discuss management options for riparian areas, and search for birds currently using riparian vegetation as migratory stopover habitat. The group was also able to visit a banding station operated by The University of Montana Avian Science Center and get a close look at a juvenile White-crowned Sparrow, a juvenile Cedar Waxwing, and a Ruby-crowned Kinglet. Twenty-six bird species were seen on the trip; one of the highlights was a Merlin that circled the group several times.
