Several strong friendships developed from these visits, prompting Kate and Nathan to make a return trip.

28th Season of Audubon Adventures for Teachers

Along with the start of a new school year comes the Audubon Adventures program. Bitterroot Audubon has participated in this National Audubon program for years and is offering the program to teachers around the valley. The title for the 2011-2012 kit is "Feathers, Fur, Fins and You," and is geared for kids grades 3-6 Participating classrooms will learn about Pollinators (featuring hummingbirds & bees), Wild Alaska, Rivers of Life and Caring for Our Planet. Each classroom will be provided with a Teacher Resource Manual, student handouts, hands-on activities for inside/outside, and an Official Certificate for participation. Teachers also receive a One-year membership to National Audubon and Audubon Magazine, which also means they are members of our local Bitterroot Audubon Chapter.

The Audubon Adventures program is provided at no cost to teachers because Bitterroot Audubon members generously provide donations to cover the fees for all the materials. Bird call study at feeders

Do you have a well-visited bird feeder? Would you like to participate in a study to record bird sounds?

The Cornell Lab of Ornithology archives millions of recordings of bird sounds. However, very few of these sounds represent alarm calls or a documented response of one bird species to another. Kate Davis of Raptors of the Rockies and UM professor Erick Greene are working on a project to document and record bird alarm calls by presenting birds at feeders with various predator species. The predator species are captive birds that are controlled throughout the process (i.e., no birds are harmed!). Kate and Erick are looking for active bird feeders at the north end of the Valley (from Stevensville north) that they could visit for a few hours. Exclosure viewing and migrant bird banding-Saturday October 8, 9-noon.

Join members of the Bitterroot Audubon Important Bird Area committee for a tour of our recently constructed ungulate exclosures, built to protect riparian habitat on the floodplain of the Bitterroot River near Florence. This trip will combine a showcasing of the new exclosures with an opportunity for a close-up view of birds currently using the Bitterroot River Important Bird Area.

Participants will walk approximately 1 mile over uneven terrain to view exclosures and discuss habitat management options. They will spend approximately an hour observing the capture and processing of birds caught in mist-nets. Some refreshments will be provided. Participants must register for this half-day trip.
