Home Improvements for Birds

Think about all the time, effort and money people put into making their properties just the perfect environment to live in and then think about the "properties" (riparian areas) that support over 75% of bird species found in Montana. These riparian areas, so crucial to the survival of birds and other wildlife, are threatened by multiple uses. Managing for their improvements is one of the greatest gifts man can give to nature. Members of Bitterroot Audubon have been involved in "giving such gifts."

At the September Audubon meeting, Sherry Ritter, Chairperson of the "Bitterroot River Important Bird Area" (IBA) Committee, will give a presentation about habitat management for birds highlighting the use of "Exclosures" at the Teller Wildlife Refuge. Following her talk, we will drive to the 4.5 acre riparian exclosure near Gird Creek (on the Teller) that was erected in 2007 to see how the shrubs have recovered without deer browsing.

Kate Stone, Field Trip Coordinator, has added that we should keep our calendars open on Saturday, October 8th, to visit a new set of ungulate exclosures on the floodplain of the Bitterroot River. These exclosures were built by Bitterroot Audubon volunteers for the purpose of protecting riparian vegetation within the IBA. This half day field trip will include a tour of the four 0.25 acre exclosures, a discussion of restoration options for interested landowners and bird watching for resident species and fall migrants.

The Bitterroot Audubon Chapter meeting will be Monday, September 19th at the Teller Wildlife Refuge at 7:00 P.M. Gather at the Education Room in the Slack Barn for Sherry's presentation but dress appropriately for the weather since we will be outside for a period of time. The Refuge is located north of Corvallis. Take the Eastside Highway from Corvallis to Quast Lane, Turn West onto Quast and then turn south on Chaffin Lane.
