#### 2012 Wildlife Rehabilitation Report

In 2012, wildlife rehabilitators Brooke Tanner, Kristi Swisher, Ellen Henry, Adele Coon and Judy Hoy collectively received 243 birds that were injured or orphaned. Of those, 175 (72%) were released, 67 died or were euthanized because of injuries and one Homing Rock Pigeon with a broken wing was rehabilitated and a home was found for it.

Of special note, the following hatchlings were successfully raised and released: three Western Screech Owls, six Red-breasted Nuthatches, one Hermit Thrush and three Lewis's Woodpeckers. Also of special note was an amazing 26 Mallard ducklings that were raised and released by Kristi Swisher.

No malformed young of the year birds were received until after the thick smoke began coming from the Idaho forest fires. Then three hatchling American Robins had underdeveloped upper bills and very vellow skin, indicating liver damage. Two died, and the third recovered and was released into the wild. One American Goldfinch with severe poisoning symptoms and short upper bill died. Seven hatchling Rock Doves were found dead, all of which had severely underdeveloped upper bill and facial bones. Also received were two fledgling birds with severe disruption to the growth of their feathers. A Wild Turkey fledgling was caught and mortally injured by a dog because it couldn't fly due to short malformed wing and tail feathers. A fledgling Osprey chick was euthanized and given to The University of Montana Osprey researchers for testing because of disrupted growth of flight, tail and body feathers. All three Red Squirrels received had visible birth defects.

We would like to thank everyone who donated to the Bitterroot Audubon Wildlife Rehabilitation Fund, which pays for food and medicine to care for rescued animals. And a very big thank you to all the people who cared enough to rescue injured or orphaned birds and take them to our rehabilitators. Thank you to the Bitterroot Audubon Society for assisting with the funding and to all who made 2012 a very successful year.

# Winter Raptor Counts- a mid-season report by Kate Stone

How many raptors over-winter in the Bitterroot Valley, and how do their populations change through the season? Citizen Scientists from Bitterroot Audubon are working to help answer these questions.

Groups of observers are going out in the first week of each winter month to count raptors along set routes in the south end of the Valley. Employees of the MPG Ranch are surveying a 50-mile route at the north end of the Valley weekly. So far, observers have counted over 1,000 raptors. Rough-legged Hawks are the top raptor (with 420 counts), followed by Red-tailed Hawks (with 350 counts). We have also seen many Bald Eagles, with numbers increasing as calving operations increase. Interestingly, observers from Stevensville to the north have seen more Red-tailed Hawks than Rough-legged Hawks, while the opposite is true from Stevensville to the south. The majority of Red-tailed Hawks, Bald Eagles, and Golden Eagles are adults. The majority of American Kestrels are males.

Observers will be out counting again in February and March. Our data will be shared with folks taking the winter raptor class with Steve Hoffman, and will also be presented at The Wildlife Society conference taking place in Whitefish at the end of February. Thanks to everyone who has participated in these counts!


#### **Call for Photos**
