Declining Populations of Long-eared Owls in Western Montana

Denver Holt, the Founder and President of the Owl Research Institute (ORI) and the Ninepipes Wildlife Research Center, is a nationally recognized authority on owls. People come from all over the country to participate in his workshops. John Ormiston, one of the founders of Bitterroot Audubon (BAS), stated, "When Denver gives a talk about owls, he literally turns into one!" Denver has researched owls and their ecology since 1978 and has published over 90 papers and technical documents. He has co-authored numerous books on birds and owls and his research has been featured in newspapers and magazines around the US. His work has also been recognized on several television programs. In 2011 he worked with the PBS Documentary film crew featuring the breeding ecology of the Snowy Owl at his research site in Barrow, Alaska.

In 2007 Denver presented his research on the Snowy Owls at one of Bitterroot Audubon's meetings and now he has agreed to return and share the long-term research (27 years) he has been doing on Long-eared Owls in Western Montana. The ORI studies on open country species of owls prove that populations can fluctuate widely on an annual basis- sometimes drastically. If using data from only a few research seasons, one could misrepresent the status and health of local and large scale populations. By conducting long-term research and monitoring at local and large geographic areas, more accurate and realistic information can be obtained thus leading to realistic conservation and management decisions.

2014 Welcome Back Waterfowl Day

Everyone who came to welcome back waterfowl on March 29 was privileged to join in celebrating the 50th birthday of the Lee Metcalf Wildlife Refuge. Even with cool rainy weather, we had a good time watching the waterfowl and other birds, eating birthday cake, and visiting with friends.

Participants reported observing a total of 44 bird species. Birds seen include several Trumpeter and Tundra Swans, a large number of Canada Geese, Bald

Eagle, Golden Eagle, Red-tailed Hawk, Northern Harrier, and American Kestrel, several Sandhill Cranes, Killdeer, Great Blue Herons on or near their rookery and Ring-necked Pheasant. Ducks observed included one or more Common Merganser, Hooded Merganser, Wood Duck, Ruddy Duck, Lesser Scaup, Bufflehead, Barrow's and Common Goldeneye, Canvasback and Green-winged Teal. There were many Mallards, Northern Pintail, Gadwall, American Wigeon, Northern Shoveler and Ring-necked Ducks feeding in the ponds on both sides of the road. A large number of American Coots were also present. With so many ducks feeding on the ponds, it was not surprising that a beautiful Peregrine Falcon was perched in a snag where it could also observe the ducks.

Other birds seen included Mourning Dove, Eurasian Collared-Dove, House Finch, Song Sparrow, Redwinged Blackbird, Western Meadowlark, American Robin, Tree Swallow, Violet-green Swallow, Downy Woodpecker, Northern Flicker, European Starling, Common Raven and Black-billed Magpie.

Thank you to the staff of the Lee Metcalf Refuge for putting up shelters to protect viewers and their scopes and for providing great snacks and birthday cake. A special thanks goes to Bob Danley for doing the publicity and to Kate Stone for all of her help, her table and a shelter. Thanks also to the BAS members who braved the cool sprinkles and occasional strong breeze to help participants with finding and identifying the birds. Most of all, thank you to everyone who came to celebrate the Lee Metcalf Refuge for providing wildlife with vital habitat and all of us with great opportunities to view the beautiful waterfowl and other wildlife that use the refuge. The establishment of the Lee Metcalf Refuge 50 years ago was a wonderful and insightful gift to all.

Celebrate Sage- May 31, 7-noon

Sagebrush ecosystems have been the target of removal and misinformation throughout their exposure to human development. The Bitterroot Valley has over 10,000 acres of sagebrush cover, yet this ecosystem has received little attention.

Join staff from the MPG Ranch to help survey the bird diversity in some of our remaining sagebrush landscapes. Participants will learn to identify the songs of two sagebrush-dependent Species of Concern in Montana: Brewer's Sparrow and Sage Thrasher. They will also learn some of the songs of other species typical of sagebrush systems, including Vesper Sparrow, Chipping Sparrow, and Clay-colored Sparrow. Our goal will be to break into small groups and survey as many sage patches as we can in one morning. Interested participants can sign up to survey additional patches on their own. Rehabbing Wildlife in Ravalli and Missoula Counties in 2013

In 2013, wildlife rehabbers, Brooke Tanner, Kristi Swisher, Ellen Henry, Adele Coon and Judy Hoy collectively received 230 birds that were injured or orphaned. Of those, 127 were released back to the wild, 103 died or were euthanized because of injuries and 6 were transferred to other rehab centers. The most common injuries to adult birds are impact by cars or window strikes and by being bitten by a cat. Many young birds fall from nests or the nests are damaged or destroyed in some way. Please do not chop down trees after nesting season begins. Several birds and small mammals were received with developmental malformations. Birds included a Canada Goose hatchling with a malformed leg bone, a Mallard hatchling with neurological damage, a European Starling fledgling with pure white leucistic feathers, and two hatchling Northern Flickers and a hatchling Rufous Hummingbird with underdeveloped upper bills. Four Red Squirrels, four Yellow Pine Chipmunks, and several Fox Squirrels were received for care. Most of the male rodents had reproductive malformations. A young Columbian Ground Squirrel was observed in the wild with cleft palate. As many birds depend on rodents for food, the increasing malformations in rodents is concerning.

In 2013, similar to 2012, after the thick smoke began coming to the Bitterroot Valley from the forest fires in California and Idaho several malformed young hatchling Rock Pigeons were found dead with severely underdeveloped upper facial bones, with extremely short upper bills and one with crossed bills. Several pigeon eggs were observed with very thin shells. The pigeons that hatched after the smoke stopped were normal, as were the egg shells. Interestingly, many adult songbirds of a variety of species with short upper bills and some that had crossed bills were photographed by bird watchers in 2013. Osprey and Bald Eagles received for care were tested for heavy metals by the University of Montana researchers because of high lead and mercury levels.

We would like to thank everyone who donated to the Bitterroot Audubon Wildlife Rehabilitation Fund, which pays for food and medicine, with a special thank you to the MPG Ranch for their generous donation. The fund currently needs donations to pay for food and medicine for birds received in 2014. An especially big thank you goes out to all the people who cared enough to rescue injured or orphaned birds and bring them to rehabbers. Thank you to the Bitterroot Audubon Society for assisting with the funding and to all who made 2013 a successful year.
