# LEWIS'S WOODPECKER "Not Your Ordinary Woodpecker"

"The Lewis's Woodpecker is the only bird named after Meriwether Lewis, who first observed it north of Helena, Montana. He noticed that it didn't have the usual undulating flight pattern of other woodpeckers; instead it flapped slowly like a crow. Lewis wrote, "I saw a black woodpecker today about the size of the lark woodpecker as black as a crow. It is a distinct species of woodpecker; it has a long tail and 'flys' a good 'deel' like the jay bird." (quote from Lewis and Clark's Mountain Wilds by Sharon Ritter, 2002). Lewis did his most complete description of them in 1806.

We are still learning about this "uncommon woodpecker" that migrates, unlike other woodpeckers, and catches insects on the fly instead of digging them out of tree bark. At the Bitterroot Audubon's April meeting we will learn about research underway at the MPG Ranch from William Blake, a Wildlife Biologist, who is specializing in the study of Lewis's Woodpeckers. He is currently

working in collaboration with Kate Stone, specifically focusing on the birds' breeding biology. Lewis's Woodpeckers are common and abundant throughout the Bitterroot Valley and on the MPG Ranch. From June to August 2014 they monitored the breeding population at the ranch. They color banded twelve adults, allowing them to identify each individual in the field. Contrary to the results of other studies, they observed high nesting success and high fledgling counts from nests in floodplain forests. They also used transect surveys to monitor post-breeding behavior and occurrence of non-resident woodpeckers. The transects suggest that Lewis's Woodpecker migration peaked in mid- to late August.

This year they plan to increase the trapping and monitoring on the ranch. They will also set up a study throughout the Bitterroot Valley to compare nesting success in different habitat types. Finally, they are investigating the use of a tracking device to determine migratory routes and over-wintering areas, which are currently unknown. Their research offers unequaled perspectives for understanding Lewis's Woodpecker breeding biology and migration.

William grew up in France although his father is from Kalispell, MT. He came to visit his grandmother in Kalispell frequently and she introduced him to bird watching when he was six years old. Through the years it has become his passion and career. He obtained his Bachelor of Science degree in Wildlife Biology from the University of Montana (UM). Over the last seven years, he has worked for a variety of organizations doing bird biology research. He obtained his Federal Master Banding Permit in 2013 and began working full time at the MPG Ranch in 2014. He intends to return to UM to complete a Masters of Science in Wildlife Biology in the Fall. William is interested in a number of avian research topics.

#### BITTERROOT AUDUBON'S 30<sup>TH</sup> ANNIVERSARY

Thirty years ago, a small band of stalwart "Birders" living in Ravalli County came together to establish a chapter of National Audubon in the Bitterroot. The idea of a local chapter had been "incubating" for months among them and then, with the urging and support of Byron Weber, the then president of the Five Valleys Audubon Chapter in Missoula, the idea was "hatched" and soon "fledged"! The group was required to recruit an additional 35 members which they did easily. Bitterroot Audubon officially received its chapter charter in November 1985. These early founders included John Ormiston, Colleen Powell, Jim Story, Alta and Arnold Gibson, and Bob Sizer. John was the first president. Jim served as first Vice President and Colleen was the first Treasurer. The first meetings were held in Colleen's kitchen.
