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YELLOWSTONE FROM THE INSIDE OUT: LOCATING THE NEXT CALDERA ERUPTION By Skip Yates

Bitterroot Audubon invites you to join Skip on a unique tour of Yellowstone National Park. Not only will he highlight the thermal features and scenic wonders but he will review the Yellowstone Volcanic System, including historic eruptions, hot-spot movement, caldera formation and possible future activity. The presentation will focus on Yellowstone's underground dynamics such as geology, geophysics and tectonics in order to locate the likely site of the next Yellowstone caldera supereruption.

Originally from Georgia (when people ask about his accent he tells them he's from Southern Montana), he graduated with a BA from Vanderbilt University and MS (Geology) from Washington State University, specializing in volcanology and economic geology (mineral exploration). He first became interested in Yellowstone because it is the present-day, hydrothermal analog to several types of mineral systems, and one can study these processes while they are ongoing. While doing research in the Park in

the late 1970's and early 1980's Skip first noted the "Mirror Plateau Geomorphic Feature" which he believes will be the location of the next Yellowstone super-eruption (caldera type eruption). Since then, he has led several geological trips through Yellowstone and parts of the Snake River Plain to study the track of the Yellowstone hot-spot. His hypothesis has been developed over several decades with supporting evidence from the fields of geology, geochemistry, geophysics, geomorphology, and satellite imagery. Skip says, "Yellowstone is unique, both geologically and for its scenic wonders. It is still one of my favorite places to visit. I never fail to learn something new whenever I visit."

Nest box Cleanup Time!

I hope your bird houses produced numerous fledglings to entertain you through summer and early fall. The swallows, bluebirds, sparrows, chickadees, etc have moved on, so it's time to clean house. They left nesting material and other debris behind, a rich environment for over-wintering insect larvae or eggs. Before the birds return to liven your spirits next spring you need to eliminate the debris to prevent the insect population from overwhelming nestlings as the days warm. Take a few minutes to open your bird houses and clean them as best you can; a dust-buster works great.
