### Letter from the President

I'm writing this letter on Labor Day, a day I have, in the past, hiked and maybe



gone on a picnic. But with today's Air Quality Index (AQI) in the "Unhealthy" range, I will stay indoors until the wind shifts. I live across the valley from St. Mary's Peak and the Sharrott Creek fire. Fingers crossed that by the time you read this, the fire will be at least partially contained. While a mountainside dotted with flames visible for miles instills fear for the animals and people close to the fire, I take some comfort (and maybe you will too) in University of Montana Professor Emeritus Dr. Richard Hutto's 2023 article about wildfires and safety:

And that's all I'm going write about the difficult summer we've just experienced. Instead, I'm turning to autumn, my favorite season.

I looked back at photos I've taken in previous Septembers, and, no surprise, most of my photos are of birds that look pretty much the same all year: Clark's Nutcrackers, Steller's Jays, Great Horn Owls, Pileated Woodpeckers, and Sharp-shinned Hawks, among others. Last September, I was lucky enough to have a Blue Jay and a Lewis's Woodpecker (but I took no good photos of those two). Black-capped Chickadees, another species that looks the same all year, are also regular visitors. It's possible that real experts may see subtle differences in the fall plumage of these birds, but I cannot!

Of course, this leads me to the birds who don't look the same all year. Many of us struggle to identify birds in autumn plumage. And because most birds don't sing in autumn, the Merlin app is not as helpful as it is during the spring and summer (and when it comes to flycatchers, I usually need Merlin's help). Frank Izaguirre, on the American Birding Association's website, offers a few reasons why birders can love fall migration: "there are more birds because it's after breeding season, migration lasts longer than in spring, and the birds themselves move more slowly, often lingering for longer in desirable habitat and sometimes affording twitchers a little extra time to catch up to rarities" (https://www.aba.org/no-8-birds-and-fall-winterplumage/). ## Starting the Summer with Successful Black Swift Surveys

At the beginning of July, the Montana Audubon Black Swift research team began surveys in the far northwest corner of Montana, near Troy and Yaak. Three of the four sites surveyed were occupied by nesting Black Swifts- a great start to the field season! The team was thrilled to get wonderful looks of these elusive birds that nest exclusively in the mossy and wet spray zone of waterfalls.

Nature in nearly all its manifestations has inspired poets since there were poets! And at least since the Roman poet Horace wrote Ars Poetica or the Art of Poetry in 19 BC, literature, including poetry, has sought to both instruct and delight.

Poets in the 'Root combines two aims in an uncommon but simple way. One person reads a poem or part of a poem that uses an element of nature to convey its message. Then, the same person or another person gives an explanation (5 min max) of some aspect of that nature element. The explanation focuses on nature interpretation, not literary interpretation. Listeners get a bit of poetry and a bit of natural history.

Anyone can volunteer to read poetry or offer nature interpretation. Most will read poems by others, but if you're a poet, we'd love to hear your own work. Master Naturalists can earn credit towards their certification!
